- Largely excluded from crucial decision-making processes

How does this translate into political participation?


The youth tend to participate in politics when the little space they have for engagement and mobility become threatened. Let us look at the following cases:

Recommendations

Inclusion: Provide space for the youth in formal and informal structures of the pro-democracy movement.

Representation: Enable youth to participate in governance. There are good examples in Thailand, Indonesia and Philippines regarding youth representation in government.

Visibility: Bring the youth in the forefront of advocacy formation and dissemination. Harness their talent in utilizing the digital space.

Sustainability: Create medium for exchange between old and new generations of prodemocracy movement, and conduct capacity building initiatives to hone their skills.
